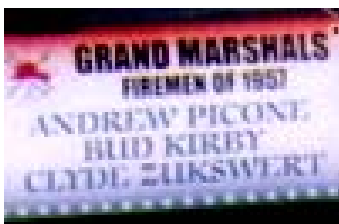

The President's Corner for August "Preparing Kiwanis for the Future" Gary Arnesen

There was a lot to vote on at the Kiwanis International Convention held in San Antonio this past July. Nearly two days went toward voting on 17 proposals. Topics were varied, but there was one overriding theme - Preparing Kiwanis for the Future. Growing our membership, world-wide, is recognized as the number one priority to ensure our services to the community will continue. What will continue is our efforts in improving the lives for children, one at a time. Based on the proposals, and leadership presentations we will be adding people from other communities and demographic groups to the fold of Kiwanis.

Encouraging news: Kiwanis is working with the IRS to change us from a 501(c4) to a 501 (c3) organization, which would allow our dues to be tax deductible. An initial IRS review has been approved and forwarded to top management for final approval.

In addition to the time we spent voting on proposals, the topic of Key Leader training of high school students, a program lead by Kiwanis, received a good deal of attention. We attended both breakout sessions and lectures by guest speakers. It's obvious that because of the success children are having with Key Leader, Kiwanis International wants an even greater focus on this program. We will probably be hearing more about this at the District Convention in Wildwood this August.

All in all, the San Antonio convention left me with some very positive feelings about the future of Kiwanis. Kiwanis will continue to be a valued experience for its active members.

Kite of Compassion July 3rd visit by members of Drew's Korean Caucus

The shooting, last May, of students and faculty members at Virginia Tech shocked the nation. The news was especially disturbing to students of Korean heritage at Drew University. They felt sorrow for friends and families of the victims, and anguish that the shooter was Korean. In their effort to find appropriate expression for this tragedy, they turned to tradition and asked artist Bon-jeong Koo to design a kite. On it, he painted a circular symbol of Korea, and a large butterfly, which represents healing and restoration of new life. The kite also had written messages that conveyed condolences in remembrance of the victims as well as wishes that such a tragedy would never happen again. Following a ceremony in the office of President, Robert Weisbuch, the Kite was forwarded to the students and families of Virginia Tech.

In addition to artist Bon-jeong, our visitors from the Korean community at Drew included Sung-won
