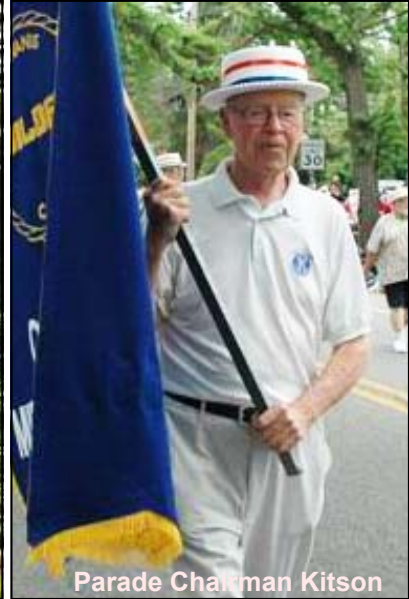

“Veteran firefighters and I organized the FP Parade 51 years ago. Today, we’re very proud of it.” Clyde Zukswert, a long time member of our club, was a key speaker at the flag-raising ceremony prior to this year’s Parade. It took place at the Fire Dept. Museum, previously the old Firehouse #1, and now located next to the current Fire House on Brooklake Rd. (Note: Our Club meets twice monthly at the Brooklake Country Club, also on Brooklake Rd.) Clyde spoke of the long history of the FD, of the artifacts and antique fire engine housed in the museum, and of the theme of this year’s parade, “America’s Historical Moments”. ### July 8, Unclaimed Money, by Mary Lloyd.

**“Eventually unclaimed money goes to the State. New Jersey can claim an inactive account in 3 years. Once in the hands of the State, it can be difficult to get it back”.** Mary

Lloyd, discussing the es cheat laws regarding unclaimed property. Mary said that the Prudential Co. has three billion in unclaimed money, which New Jersey would like to claim.

One source of good information on unclaimed money is the web site, [www.missingmoney.com](http://www.missingmoney.com) It provides a free database for your search. It is endorsed by participating states, which includes most of them. Unclaimed money is often found in: Insurance companies, deposits to utility companies, and demutualized insurance policies. Also, look up old stock certificates, or dividends from them. Also, check a state where your kids have gone to college, or have lived. You may try the name of a late relative (up to 10 or 15 years after death).



If concerned about bank accounts with little activity, sign a bank form to keep your account “active”. Be careful to watch for letters from your banks that may remind you of an old account in danger of being claimed by the State.

### The Thursday Morning Club

**“This 111 year old Madison institution is the only Club that owns and operates its own Community House”, Bernice Grohol, co-chair with Olga Soriano, of the capitol campaign, “Building for the Future”.**

TMC was started as a lecture club in 1897, but soon changed to a service organization when the needs of the evolving community became apparent. Many innovative programs were started by the Club, and later taken over by government or community-based organizations. Among them were garbage collection ('06), a “settlement house” (1924), to help immigrant families become “settled”, health clinics, nursery school and child care, a community theatre (“*The Green Door Players*”), and *Friends of the Madison Library*. The Madison Community House is now home to 35 organizations: self-help (“*Dress for Success*”), political (Republican and Democratic), civic (preschool) and service (joint projects with Madison Kiwanis).

The original building has expanded to meet changing needs, and now must be restructured to comply with building codes. The capitol campaign is within \$300,000.00 of its two million dollar goal.
