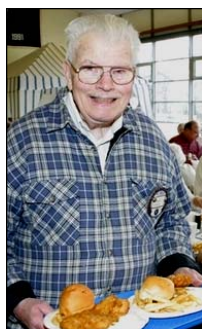
Fund Raising Helps – – – Our – – –> Community Service

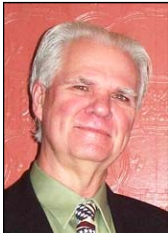
Regina Braham, Director of Community Relations for *Jersey Battered Women’s Service*, told the story of Lisa, and the problems faced by victims and their families, as well as by our larger society. Of the 75,000 incidents of domestic violence reported in NJ in ‘06, at least 2,500 happened right here in Morris County. JBWS works with community organizations—schools, colleges, hospitals, the court system, to help victims, rehabilitate family members, and educate the public. Jan.15, American Automobile Association Traffic Safety Program.

“When you pass a truck, do it in one shot, and watch its mirrors and blind spots”

Ed Baginski, traffic safety specialist, AAA of Florham Park.

Ed’s meeting with us was part of the American Automobile Association’s *Driver Improvement Program*. He left us with important advice about driving:

- The more maneuverable vehicle gives way to the less maneuverable one. For example, a truck has only 70% of the braking power of a car.
- Leave greater distance between vehicles for rain, and more for snow, or poor light conditions. For clear conditions, 2-3 seconds, for rain, 6-10 seconds, and for snow or ice, 20 or more seconds..
- Adjust your mirrors to eliminate blind spots and your tire pressure for temperature and weather conditions. Regularly clean your headlights. .
- Carry an emergency kit that includes water, snacks, medications and blankets, in addition to tools, phone, emergency lights and other items determined by your experience.
- Insist on seat belts for all passengers, and pull over for phone calls.

High School students may start in their Junior year as *Cadets*. (see photo, p.1). They and their parents sign contracts, and they can ride 3 or 4 hours with adult crews. Some go on to careers in medicine. Active (adult) members take courses to qualify for EMT (Emergency Medical Technician) status. They carry a kit for evaluating a victim before the *Rig* (ambulance) arrives. With radio communication, they decide who goes to the scene and who brings the Rig. Police are responsible for response to the scene and for oxygen
