“HOLIDAY NUT SALES BEAT LAST YEAR’S RECORD BY 15%” Fedeler

Chairman Jerry Fedeler announced the close of a successful nut sale for 2006.: “Total sales were \$12,512, giving our club a net income of \$3,225. In 2005 our net was \$2,803, so we had a 15% increase! Our active members deserve much credit for breaking the old record, for we have fewer members now than we did last year. Members of the Builders Club at St. Patrick School were very helpful; they sold \$610.00 worth of nuts.
