For this meeting, Chatham native Bruce Rex, who is confined to a wheelchair, brought his CCI Service Dog, Satchel, to help us understand the role of an assistance dog. Bruce also invited Chatham resident, Jean Earle, along with a puppy, Harlin, that she and her younger daughter are raising. In describing the tasks that Satchel perform for him, Rex directed him to take some mail from the floor and place it on his lap. Satchel followed his orders with precision.



The CCI assistance dogs are well trained, and just as carefully matched with the people who receives them. In Bruce's case, the

process took three years, and culminated in Bruce praising Satchel a two-week live-in training session at the CCI Training Center in Farmingdale, NY... Satchel has learned to obey 45 commands,

and will refuse to eat anything until given permission by Bruce. Jean then described the training that she and Abbie are giving

> to Harlin, including simple obedience commands, and "lots of loving". She also told of the CCI Dog that her daughter, Morgan has, and how "Tomba" has changed her life dramatically. We were impressed, and left the meeting in awe of the skills these dogs bring to those with handicaps, as well as admiration for those who raise the puppies and for the trainers
