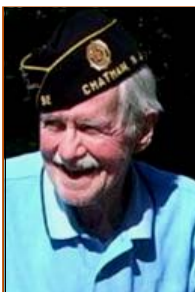
Kiwanians Decorate Gravesites To Honor Veterans for Memorial Day **Our May 21 distribution of flags to veterans' gravesites in Fairmount Cemetery**

This Borough cemetery has grave sites dating to the Revolutionary War, though it was opened only in the late 19th Century, . The earlier graves were moved to Fairmount when their cemeteries were closed. Recently, our club has collaborated with our former President, Bob Huntington (1971-72), an American Legion member of Chatham Post 92. Every year Bob arranges with the Legion to supply flags to our Kiwanis volunteers, organized by Jerry Cunningham, for distribution to the graves of veterans. This year, as before, we met with Bob around the Veterans Memorial flagpole and plaque (created in 1975 by Post 92). After he gave us the flags, we fanned out, looking for veterans' sites. Most had military issued grave-stones and the metal Legion medallions that mark them and provide holders for the flags.

It was a beautiful day, but our mood was tempered by the knowledge that the words on many sites indicated a death while on active duty. All are tragic, but most poignant are those families whose service members died at an early age, and those who have lost more than one member. In the June 2007 Crier is another flag story and a photo of the memorial plaque to the only sons of William and Mary Drabble, William W, age 23, and Philip M, age 21. The President's Corner, *A Tribute to Dud Healy, Friend and Kiwanian*

Dud was an active member of our club for over 30 years and frankly it's hard for me to imagine the club without him. As you know, he was a passionate marathon runner and I always marveled at his energy and enthusiasm as he traveled all over the world into his late eighties running in races in places like Australia and New Zealand. Dud had that same passion and enthusiasm for everything he did with Kiwanis. He always was involved in all our activities, from getting up at the crack of dawn to recycle newspapers, to working at our fish and chips dinner, to working with the high school Key Club, to leading the singing at our meetings, to being the corner stone of our Kiwanis bowling team.

I'm sure some of you who knew Dud longer than I did could tell many wonderful stories about him, but I will tell just one of my own. A couple years ago, when Dud was 93, he asked me if I would substitute on the bowling team for one of the team members who couldn't make it. I hadn't bowled for years but was a reasonably good bowler years ago with occasional 200 games, so I said, *why not?* When I got to Plaza Lanes in Madison, I was surprised to see that the place was absolutely packed with bowlers. I had no idea that so many people were still bowling. In my first game I was doing reasonably well but I quickly realized that Dud, at age 93, was doing even better. At one point I looked around and saw that a crowd was gathering to watch us, and I was pretty sure that they weren't there to see me. Sure enough, I bowled a respectable 150 but Dud bowled a 168 to the pleasure of everyone who was watching.



I am so happy that we had a chance to celebrate Dud's 95th birthday with him at our meeting. It was a wonderful occasion, and as I told Dud at the time, we were honored to know him, were honored to have him as a friend and were proud to have him as a fellow Kiwanian. On Friday the 15th, the night before the funeral, Dud's friends and fellow club and church members had an opportunity to meet with and offer condolences to members of his family at the Bradley Funeral Home. As his friend and fellow music lover and Kiwanian, and your editor, I was glad for the opportunity to meet his daughters, Diane Clymer and Marsha Stone, and his son, Art,. They were gracious in sharing with me stories of his life that I hadn't known. Since their dad's funeral, we have exchanged emails and continued our conversations, for which I am grateful. Listed below are excerpts from that correspondence. **Bob Stannard**

From Art Healy:

Hearing from such nice people has helped me in the grieving process. Dad was so full of life and, regardless of his advanced age, his passing is still a shock to me. He was the most consistently optimistic, content person I could ever imagine. I believe it was due to his simplicity of character, and to a methodical, disciplined lifestyle that gave him comfort. He had a most uncanny ability to maintain a consistently sunny disposition, and to let the stress and strife of the world pass him by. While most of us are affected, in various degrees, by human events, and by actions of other people, Dad never let anything get him down. His presence always put a smile on other people's faces. I will strive the rest of my life to remember these things about Dad, and will be very fortunate to incorporate just a few of these gifts into my own interactions and thoughts.

From Diane Healy Clymer:

He was so dedicated to that (recycling) effort. I live in the Philadelphia area and, if he was visiting, needed to get back to Chatham by Sunday afternoon so he was ready to join the crew bright and early on Monday morning - they were depending on him!

I never attended any meetings with him but last July 4th, I visited Chatham because of the High School Reunion weekend. I was invited to walk in the July 4th Parade with the Kiwanis Club. While a lot of the "older" members rode on the float, Dad and I walked the whole parade route behind the float. He wore his Kiwanis shirt, pin and proudly had on the "straw" hat and waved

It was an honor for me to walk in the parade with him and his fellow Kiwanians and was welcomed as an "honorary" member of the club for the day.
