It is composed of vets and other volunteers who ensure that our service people receive the support they need. Care packages are sent to our troops in Iraq and Afghanistan, and also brought to the vets at Lyons Hospital and the Soldiers Home in Menlo Park.

Volunteers from this Raritan-based organization are also active in local schools. They collect food and toiletries, and encourage students to write to individual service men or women. Sometimes they receive thank-you notes in return. Liz worked on a sewing project with students in Mine Hill. They made pillow cases decorated with American and patriotic scenes for the troops. 

Perry's introduction to our club was as an invited speaker on finance, banking, and the travel it entailed. Within a short time, he was a club member, and served for many years, until his recent failing health forced him to slow down. Even then, his wit and optimism remained until the very end.

He had a number of major interests, and he gave to each his enthusiastic support: the Chatham United Methodist Church and choir; a condo in Cape May, and a cabin in rural NY State; the Madison Environmental Commission; flying, and running; *RISE*, a home repair program for the needy in Steuben County NY, and the Chatham Kiwanis Club.

Some of his service to our club was visible, such as his membership on our Board of Directors, and his job arranging for invocations, as a member of the Spiritual Aims Committee. Among the examples of his less visible service is his donation of tax preparation and advice for our Club.



Robert F Franklin, "Uncle Bob was a truly gentle man" Bob's nephew, at memorial serv.





Bob's memorial service, February 27, at Chatham UMC, included participation by many of his family members, and it demonstrated the strong and positive influence Bob and Donna had on their children, and even on their grandchildren. Bob earned degrees in English and Psychology, and worked as a lab tech, Development Engineer, and Underwriter.

Encouraged by a friend in Chatham Kiwanis, Bob joined the club in 1998, and served for six years. He was a member of the Division for Home Calls of the Human and Spiritual Values Committee, and on the Membership Committee, he was in the Transportation Division. Like most of our members, he helped with the selection of program speakers by the Meeting Committees.

While many of our newest members didn't know Bob, those who attended his memorial service learned to appreciate his influence on family and friends. His son, Tom, described it well: "Dad was a Renaissance man, with a wide field of interests; a student and teacher of human relationships" He expressed his love in many ways, to his wife, Donna, and to their children and extended families. Bob followed his own advice to "Always say 'I love you'", even as his Alzheimer's symptoms progressed in recent years.

He encouraged his children to share his wide interests, especially in music. His grandchildren responded by forming a musical group: violin, cello, French horn and oboe, plus vocal. They played and sang, and added immensely to the very moving memorial service. The service bulletin featured a children's drawing of a sun smiling on the flower pot named "Pop Pop", with birds, bugs, and musical notes, all hand colored.
