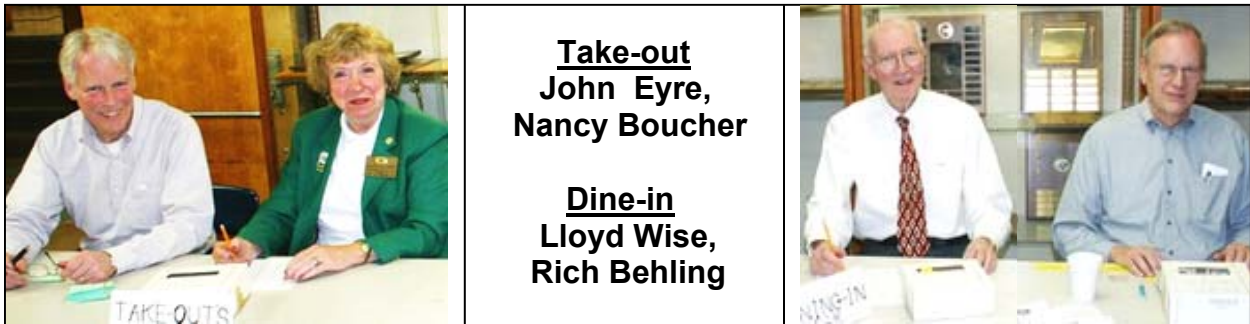

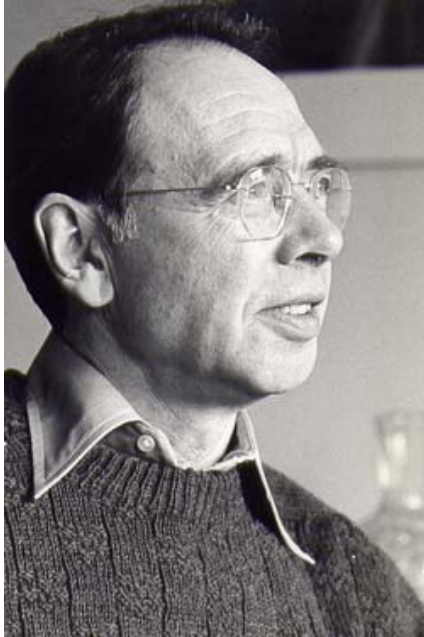

PETER DYKEMA, Our Friend and Kiwanian: July 1, 1918 to March 24, 2007

Yesterday, a memorial service was held at the Chatham United Methodist Church, to celebrate the life of our friend and fellow club member, Peter Dykema. It was a moving service, with recollections by Peter's son Jim, of Morristown, a cello solo by his daughter, Betsy, of Irvington NY, and a talk by her husband, Jim, describing his father-in-law, Peter. I had the honor of representing our club in giving tribute to Peter's 50 years as a Kiwanian, and to the quiet and unassuming way his presence has helped us to maintain the tradition of community service of which we are all very proud.

Peter and Charlotte, his wife of 65 years, had enjoyed singing with the Westfield based Madrigal Singers, and during the memorial service, the group performed two beautiful songs in his memory, including "I will not leave you comfortless" by Byrd... Then, the brass sextet from the Chatham Community Band performed Handel's "Wher'er you walk" in honor of Pete's many years of faithful service with that organization.

The Reverend Paul Maliel led us in scripture, song and prayer, and then recounted the story of Peter's help with a church project. A beautiful stained glass window had been commissioned, and it was installed between two large front doors. Peter was asked to design an electrical system to illuminate the new window. He created one that not only lit the window from behind, so it could be enjoyed by all who pass that way, but would do so, automatically, every night, .

During the reception that followed, we were able to meet with Charlotte and other family members, including their daughter, Joan, of Alameda, California, to express our sympathy for their loss. And, we shared with each other stories of our friend and fellow Kiwanian, who will long remain in our memories.
