6 to select nominees for the office of Vice President and for three new Directors.



March 25. GSWA

"I want to clean up the Passaic River", Sally Rubin, Executive Director, discussing her passion for the mission of the Great Swamp Watershed Association.

The Watershed is a 55 square mile area that includes portions of 10 towns, and contains 5 streams that flow into the Great Swamp, and in turn, into the Passaic River. The GSWA is a nonprofit, member supported group whose mission is to improve and protect the quality of its water and other natural resources. It has developed various forms of educational outreach, and it's work is supported by volunteers from the surrounding towns. Upcoming breakfast meetings at its headquarters in Harding Township, include "Where Does Your Water Come From", on Tuesday, May 13, and "What's in Your Water", on Tuesday, June, 10, from 8:00 to 9:30. April 1, Postpartum Place

"Our business is about mothers and babies", Maria Parlapiano, director of Postpartum Place at 55 Main St., Chatham.

The eleven year old business was started in response to the practice of early hospital discharge of new mothers and babies in the '90's. The counseling and support that had been customery during an extended hospital stay was no longer available, so Maria's services evolved to fill the need. These services now include education workshops for new parents, new mother support



groups, and help and training in breast-feeding, The newest service, an overnight accommodation with support for new moms (and dads), is located in a special suite in next-door Parrot Mill Inn. A stay at the "Nest" includes a breastfeeding specialist who sleeps in an adjacent room, help with baby care, and breakfast in the room or in the Inn's attractive dining room.

The New Moms Boutique at Postpartum Place offers nursing pillows, nursing bras and related clothing, baby slings and other supplies, and a variety of gifts for expectant and new mothers. It also helps moms in special circumstances such as with premature babies, babies with slow development, food intolerance,

April 8, Visiting Nurse Association

"The VNA is more than just nursing", Dick Plambeck, reporting on the visit by Deborah Castro and Shekeya Watkins of the VNA of Northern NJ.

In addition to the familiar skilled nursing care other home health care services are provided, both for the patient, and the caregiver, and often for the whole family. Dick was impressed by the Telehealth Service, where a TV monitor is placed in the home and connected to the phone line, allowing a virtual visit by the distant Nurse, with the assistance of an on-site Home Health Aid. This has often reduced the time a patient must spend in the hospital. Other in home plans include medication management for patients who might be forgetful, house calls for groceries, where a volunteer shopper will bring food right to the home, and respite and time-out services, to relieve the full time caregiver for a few hours a day, a few days a week.

The hospice program provides a compassionate team approach, with physicians, nurses, aids, social workers, counselors and volunteers for patients deemed to be terminally ill. This provides physical, emotional and spiritual support for the patients and their families. See www.hometeam.org for more information.

This club for young adults with special needs meets twice monthly in the Denville office of DAWN, their agency advisor, and advocate for independent living. In spite of any physical challenges the club members may have, they are active and enthusiastic, and quick to volunteer. Their projects have included collecting items for soldiers, selling decorated



bags at the mall, and conducting a garage sale from which they raised \$500.

Morris County, their membership area, poses transportation challenges because of its size. As a result, Joyce is corre-
