John Stockly, Friend and Kiwanian, a Compassionate Man

"He would rather save lives than take them", a family member, speaking at the September 14 memorial service at St. Paul's in Chatham.

John enlisted in the American Field Service early in WWII, and served as an ambulance driver with the British army in Africa. He almost died carrying wounded German soldiers. A Chatham resident since '61, he has long been a loyal member of the Chatham Emergency Squad.

He was a history buff, a photographer, and a great story teller. His children can all attest to that. John also loved to travel. He and Betty, his bride of 58 years, enjoyed our Kiwanis-sponsored tour of the Mississippi on the American Queen in 2007. He died on September 9 at 86. The Monday morning recycling crew welcomed Dick, who had traveled from N. Kansas City to visit friends in the Chatham area. Later, over coffee, he told us that he had brought some of our traditions to the Kiwanis Club of North Kansas City. including recycling and a monthly newsletter. On September 17, our recycle chair, Dick Ligertwood, issued his report for 2009. In the past 12 months, we have filled 4 containers of papers, averaging 10 tons each, for Great Northern Recycling. For this we received \$904.80. However, the price has now risen to \$40, per ton, so receipts should rise in the future.

NJ Clean Communities Project September 16, Shepard Kollock Park Cleanup Leads to Fascinating Historical Discoveries.

After a few quarterly cleanup sessions in the area of Ogden St. and the Borough Recycling Center, the Director of Public Works, Bob Venezia, asked us to switch to the Shepard Kollock Park, located between Parrot Mill Road and the Passaic River. Gary Arnesen, project chair, was happy to share his enthusiasm about the good turnout of volunteers.

As they drove from Powder Mill Rd. to Henderson Rd. and the parking area, those who were new to the park were impressed by the large grassed recreation area. It is used for many sports, including soccer, lacrosse, baseball (and probably kite flying), At the north end, near the parking area,

is a baseball backstop, and near it are display boards and plaques, containing stories of important people and events in the history of the area. Including Parrott and Kollock..

Around 1850 George Parrott built a grist (flour) mill between his mill pond and the river. In recent years it was covered over to make the park, with only Parrott Mill Road remaining. The park was named after a Revolutionary hero, Shepard Kol-

lock, whose print shop was located where 55 Main St. is now. As a First Lieutenant in the Second Continental Artillery, he had fought in Trenton and Monmouth and spent time at Valley Forge. When George Washington recommended that he be authorized to create a "camp press" to counter the

4 pro-British propaganda of some Loyalist printers, his strong voice for independence earned him the reputation of "Editor for Freedom".

Our cleanup project started at 9:AM, when orange litter bags were distributed. We hiked south, along the edge of the woods, until the first trail appeared. It was one of many that had been designed and laid out by Boy Scouts, working on their awards and badges for advancement in rank. As we walked toward the river, collecting glass, metal, plastic and

other trash, more trails and trash were sighted, with the litter often protected by tough brambles and prickles. We continued along near the river, sometimes removing cans and bottles half buried in the mud.

Finally, we came upon graffiti-covered concrete structures that were remnants of the old trolley line that once ran from Millburn and Summit, through Chatham and Madison, to Morristown by way of

Park Avenue. As we walked back to the parking area, we stopped at a memorial plaque, erected last year in honor and memory of Bob Thompson, our Kiwanis President ('97-98) and longtime active member of the Environmental Commission. The plaque states that Bob's "tireless efforts to conserve and beautify have made Chatham a better place to live" *

In commenting on the environmental efforts of our club under the NJ Clean Communities program, former Chatham Mayor (and now President-Elect of our Club) Dick Plambeck, said that an important result of our cleanup of the Ogden St./Recycle Center area, and now the Shepard Kollock Park and river

area, will be the prevention of hazardous waste from traveling with rain water runoff via roads and streams, to the river, which is used as a water source for a number of nearby communities.
